COMMITTEE CHAIRS

Lee Fleisher, MD

Professor and Chair of Anesthesiology, University of Pennsylvania/American Society of Anesthesiologists Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Dr. Lee A. Fleisher is the Robert D. Dripps Professor and Chair of Anesthesiology and Critical Care at the University of Pennsylvania, School of Medicine. His research focuses on perioperative cardiovascular risk assessment and reduction and measurement of quality of care and received numerous federal, industry, and foundation grants related to these subjects. Dr. Fleisher has published more than 225 articles, chapters, books, and abstracts. He is a member of the CSAC, Administrative Board of the Council of Academic Specialties of the AAMC, and the Institute of Medicine.

William Gunnar, MD, JD

Director, National Surgery Program Office, Veterans Health Administration Washington, District of Columbia

On November 23, 2008, William Gunnar, MD, JD, was appointed to the position of National Director of Surgery, Veterans Health Administration (VHA). He has operational oversight for 132 VHA surgical programs performing 400,000 surgical procedures annually, authority for VHA surgical services policy, and the VA Surgical Quality Improvement Program (VASQIP). Dr. Gunnar has the following degrees: BA/MS (Northwestern, 1979), MD (Northwestern, 1983), and JD (Loyola Chicago, 2006). He is certified by the American Board of Surgery and the American Board of Thoracic Surgery, a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, and appointed Clinical Professor of Surgery, George Washington University.

Robert Cima, MD, MA

Professor of Surgery, Mayo Clinic Rochester, Minnesota

Dr. Robert Cima is a Professor of Surgery and Consultant in Colon and Rectal Surgery at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester. Dr. Cima serves as the Vice-chairman of the Surgical and Procedural Committee that oversees the daily function and growth of the entire Mayo Clinic surgical practice. He leads the surgical quality and safety subcommittee that monitors, reports and coordinates practice improvement. Dr. Cima also heads up the national surgical quality measures compliance and

reporting unit. This provides Dr. Cima with in-depth knowledge of how surgical measures are implemented, monitored, and reported in a diverse and complex surgical practice.

Richard Dutton, MD, MBA

Chief Quality Officer, United States Anesthesia Partners Park Ridge, Illinois

Richard P. Dutton earned his BA from Harvard University in 1983, his MD from Tufts University School of Medicine in 1987, and an MBA at the University of Maryland in 2001. He completed residency in anesthesiology at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston in 1991 and then served as an attending anesthesiologist at the National Naval Medical Center. In 1994, Dr. Dutton joined the Faculty at the R Adams Cowley Shock Trauma Center of the University of Maryland, where he served as Director of Trauma Anesthesiology and Director of Clinical Operations. Dr. Dutton was promoted to the rank of Professor in 2009. In 2009 Dr. Dutton founded the American Society of Anesthesiologist's Anesthesia Quality Institute, and launched the National Anesthesia Clinical Outcomes Registry. In 2015, Dr. Dutton left the ASA to become the first Chief Quality Officer for United States Anesthesia Partners.

TeMaya Eatmon

Atlanta, Georgia

TeMaya Eatmon was diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 36 and had a total of eight surgeries within six months. Ms. Eatmon believes that the initial surgery is the reason she is alive today as a strong and confident patient advocate. Since that time, she has committed to make a difference in how cancer is researched, treated, and prevented among minority/young women.

TeMaya became involved both locally and nationally with key organizations that best aligned with her advocacy efforts. Her local involvement includes being a past board member for It's The Journey, Inc., serving on the Hadassah Check It Out! Speakers Bureau. She also participates with her local health system, Northside Hospital and their Network of Hope. She participates locally and nationally for Susan G. Komen as an Advocate in Science, African-American Health Equity Advisory Committee, and Sisters of Promise. Her commitment, dedication, and passion have not gone unnoticed as the Atlanta Braves recognized her with their Diamond of Hope Award, and the Atlanta Falcons also recognized her with their Dazzle and Dine program. She was also recognized by Ford Motor Company and chosen as a Model of Courage. As a young breast cancer survivor, Ms. Eatmon believes she can bring a diverse, fresh, perspective and voice to the Committee that will inevitably impact change.

Elisabeth Erekson, MD, MPH, FACOG, FACS

Interim Chair, Obstetrics and Gynecology Manchester, New Hampshire

Dr. Erekson is the interim chair of the department of Obstetrics and Gynecology and service line leader of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Dartmouth-Hitchcock. She holds academic appointments as an associate professor in both the department of Obstetrics and Gynecology and The Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy & Clinical Practice. She received her medical degree from the University of Illinois and her master's in public health from Brown University.

Dr. Erekson is a practicing board-certified surgeon in the subspecialty of female pelvic medicine

and reconstructive surgery and the specialty of obstetrics and gynecology. Her current research projects include claims-data linkage analyses of population-based cohort studies to explore health care utilization of older women as well as treatment seeking behavior and needs. Dr. Erekson also has a strong focus on quality improvement and outcomes in gynecologic surgery. She also serves as an American Urogynecologic Society (AUGS) committee chair, quality council member, and national advisor of the Quality Improvement and Outcomes Research Network facilitating the collection of data on variation in practice patterns and outcomes for the surgical treatment of pelvic organ prolapse and urinary incontinence across nine different health systems in the United States and Canada.

Frederick Grover, MD

Professor of Cardiothoracic Surgery, University of Colorado School of Medicine Aurora, Colorado

Dr. Frederick L. Grover is a Professor of Cardiothoracic Surgery and Past Chair of the Department of Surgery at the University of Colorado. From 1991 to 2003, Dr. Grover was Professor and Head of the Division of Cardiothoracic Surgery at the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center and Chief of Surgical Services at the Denver Veterans Affairs Medical Center. He belongs to numerous professional organizations, actively serving in organizational leadership and committee activities, including but not limited to, a term as President of The Society of Thoracic Surgeons, a term on the NQF Board of Directors and on the United Network for Organ Sharing Board of Directors. Dr. Grover has authored or co-authored 296 scientific papers, many of which are in the area of utilizing surgical databases for quality improvement, and he is an advocate for physician involvement in quality improvement and healthcare policy development.

John Handy, MD

Thoracic Surgeon, American College of Chest Physicians Portland, Oregon

Dr. John Handy's professional evolution over three decades includes general surgery, cardiothoracic surgery, transplantation, and specialized thoracic surgery. He established programs where none previously existed (lung/heart-lung transplant, thoracic oncology, thoracic surgery) or took over programs which were in trouble (VA cardiac surgery). Thus, early in his career he developed interest in defining, implementing, and monitoring quality in clinical care. As a program director, one has responsibility for understanding and stewardship of the cost of care. Further, colleagues must be converted to the cause. His scope has steadily grown from institution, to state, and now to a broad region of the United States. NQF participation is a natural progression.

Mark Jarrett, MD, MBA

Chief Quality Officer, Associate Chief Medical Officer, North Shore-LIJ Health System Great Neck, New York

Dr. Mark Jarrett is currently Chief Quality Officer for the North Shore-LIJ Health System. He also serves as Associate Chief Medical Officer for the system. He previously served as Chief Medical Officer and DIO at Staten Island University Hospital as well as Director of Rheumatology at SIUH for 27 years. He was senior and founding partner of a rheumatology practice for 30 years. Dr. Jarrett is Professor of Medicine at the Hofstra North Shore-LIJ School of Medicine. He has

extensive research experience, and has been published on the subject of the immune response in systemic lupus erythematosus. He is board certified in internal medicine, rheumatology, and geriatrics, a Fellow of the American College of Physicians and the American College of Rheumatology.

Clifford Ko, MD, MS, MSHS, FACS, FASCRS

Director, Division of Research and Optimal Patient Care, American College of Surgeons Professor of Surgery, Department of Surgery, UCLA Schools of Medicine and Public Health Chicago, Illinois

Dr. Clifford Ko is the Director of the Division of Research and Optimal Patient Care at ACS. He oversees all the quality improvement and accreditation/verification programs and activities of the division, including those related to bariatric, cancer, pediatric, and trauma surgeries. He also oversees the Surgeon Specific Registry (SSR), the Coalition for Quality in Geriatric Surgery (CQGS), and the Improving Surgical Care and Recovery (ISCR) project informed for enhanced recovery protocols. Clinically, he is a double board-certified surgeon with a practice focusing on patients with colorectal cancer. At UCLA, he is Professor of Surgery, and Professor of Health Services at the UCLA Schools of Medicine and Public Health. Dr. Ko has published over 400 manuscripts and is recognized as one of the Best Doctors in America.

Barbara Levy, MD, FACOG, FACS

Vice President, Health Policy, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists Washington, DC

Dr. Barbara Levy has over 25 years of experience with direct surgical and primary care, research, and training. She oversees ACOG's Office of Global Women's Health programs, the Voluntary Review of Quality of Care, Safety Certification for Outpatient Practice Excellence for Women's Health, American Indian/Alaska Native Health Program, Health Economics, Strategic Health Care Initiatives department and programs for Maternal Mortality and Fetal & Infant Mortality. Prior to ACOG, Dr. Levy was in private practice and medical director of Women's Health and Breast Center and Women's and Children's Services for the Franciscan Health System in Tacoma, WA.

Barry Markman, MD

Senior Medical Director Medicaid, Aetna Las Vegas, Nevada

Dr. Barry Markman graduated Union College, *summa cum laude*-economics, and continued at NYU Medical School graduating AOA. After training at UT Southwestern, he obtained Board Certification in General/Plastic Surgery. In 18 years of private practice Dr. Markman performed a significant number of reconstructive/cosmetic procedures and served as an adjuvant clinical professor at University of Nevada and Touro Medical School. His research experience includes being a lead principal investigator for multiple National IRB oversight clinical trials regarding saline/silicone breast implants. National speaking forums and publications were focused on adipose tissue anatomy/physiology, liposuction, hair transplantation, and silicone mastopathy. Multiple Intellectual property patents have been acquired in the fields of hair transplantation devices, biologic tissue grafts, and vehicle technology. His MBA and paralegal certificate were acquired at UNLV.

Dr. Markman is currently a Senior Medicaid Medical Director for Aetna primarily supporting the

Special Investigative Unit. His past responsibilities as a Medical Director included utilization review and case management. During his tenure in managed care, he developed several surgical quality platforms, as well as collaborating on Med Tech policies.

Lawrence Moss, MD

Surgeon-in-Chief, Nationwide Children's Hospital Columbus, Ohio

R. Lawrence Moss serves as Surgeon-in-Chief at Nationwide Children's Hospital and Boles Professor of Surgery at The Ohio State University. Dr. Moss led the first multicenter randomized trial in children's surgery. This study, assessing surgical outcomes for necrotizing enterocolitis was published in *NEJM*. He is a founding member of the Executive Steering Committee of the American College of Surgeons National Surgical Quality Improvement Program-Pediatric. He served as director of Surgical Quality for Yale-New Haven Hospital. He is the Chair of the Surgical Section of the AAP and a member of the American College of Surgeons Children's Surgery Verification Committee.

Amy Moyer

Manager of Value Measurement, The Alliance Fitchburg, Wisconsin

Amy Moyer is the Manager of Value Measurement for The Alliance, a not-for-profit cooperative of employers whose mission is to move healthcare forward by controlling costs, improving quality and engaging individuals in their health. The Alliance represents 180 employers who provide health benefits to 80,000 citizens in Wisconsin, Illinois, and Iowa. Keith Olsen, PharmD, FCCP, FCCM

Professor and Dean, College of Pharmacy, University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences Omaha, Nebraska

Dr. Olsen is a Professor of Pharmacy and Chair, Department of Pharmacy Practice and a Critical Care/Surgery Specialist at the University of Nebraska Medical Center. He has published over 275 peer-reviewed publications, abstracts, and book chapters in critical care and infectious diseases. He was one of the lead authors on the ASHP/IDSA/SHEA/SIS joint Antimicrobial Prophylaxis Guidelines, served the NQF, and CMS on intensive care eMeasures, and was on the Surgical Care Improvement Project (SCIP) since its inception. He also serves as the Chair of the Guideline Committee for the Society of Critical Care Medicine. Dr. Olsen offers to the NQF a unique blend of patient care experience, guideline and quality measures development, and administrative perspective.

Lynn Reede, DNP, MBA, CRNA, FNAP

Chief Clinical Officer, American Association of Nurse Anesthetists Park Ridge, Illinois

Dr. Lynn Reede has been a certified registered nurse anesthetist for more than 30 years in roles that include clinician, educator, and facility leadership. Lynn is currently the Chief Clinical Officer with the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists. She leads the member and staff teams

responsible for development and reassessment of resources for anesthesia practice focused on population health, improved patient outcomes, and value based care working with the patient and interprofessional team.

Christopher Saigal, MD, MPH

Professor, UCLA Los Angeles, California

Dr. Christopher Saigal is a Professor and Vice Chair, Department of Urology at the David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA. An R-01-funded health services researcher, Dr. Saigal currently is supported as PI for over \$6 million in NIH grant funding. His research focuses on the nexus of quality of care, access to care, and practice pattern trends in urology. Associate Professor of Surgery, University of Florida-Gainesville Gainesville, Florida

Dr. Salvatore T. Scali practices at both Shands Hospital—University of Florida, Gainesville, FL and the Malcolm Randall V.A. Medical Center. He graduated Phi Beta Kappa from University of New Hampshire and completed medical school at Georgetown University. He completed both a general surgery and vascular surgery fellowship at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Boston, MA and the Harvard-Longwood Vascular Research Program, Boston, MA and he also went on and trained at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, Lebanon, NH. Dr. Allan Siperstein is the Chair of Endocrine Surgery at the Cleveland Clinic. He is Program Director for the General Surgery Residency, Endocrine Surgery Fellowship and co-directs the Surgical Outcomes Fellowship. He obtained medical degree at the University of Texas, Southwestern Medical School at Dallas and general surgery residency/endocrine surgery training at UCSF. Since 1999 he has been a staff member at the Cleveland Clinic. He has had a long interest in quality and patient safety. He has experience in improving compliance with the Surgical Care Improvement Project Measures and is Physician Champion for the National Surgical Quality Improvement Program.

Dr. Stein is a board-certified ophthalmologist and fellowship-trained glaucoma specialist with 10 years of experience caring for patients with ocular diseases. In addition, he is a health services researcher who has published extensively on topics including eye service utilization, safety and outcomes of ocular surgical procedures, costs of eye care, quality of life of patients with ocular diseases, and the cost-effectiveness of different interventions for glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy, and macular degeneration. Dr. Larissa Temple is a colorectal surgeon at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. She is an Associate Professor of Surgery and Director of the colorectal survivorship clinic. Dr. Temple is funded and published extensively in outcomes including patient decision making, patient satisfaction, practice variation, and quality of life. Dr. Temple is an active member of the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons and co-chairs the Quality and Safety Committee.

Barbee Whitaker, PhD

Director, American Association of Blood Banks Bethesda, Maryland

Dr. Whitaker is Director of the Department of Research for AABB. She is also the Director of the AABB Center for Patient Safety, which has been designated an official patient safety organization by the United States government. She is responsible for AABB's hemovigilance activities in coordination with hospitals, blood centers, and the federal government. Dr. Whitaker is responsible for the AABB Blood Survey of collection, utilization, and patient blood management. She served as the coordinator of the AABB Interorganizational Task Force on Biovigilance, representing both the public and private sectors. She coordinates the blood transfusion section of the World Health Association's Notify Library, a searchable compendium of adverse events associated with Medical Products of Human Origin. Prior to joining AABB in 2005, she directed standards and certification activities at the Plasma Protein Therapeutics Association and was the National Officer of Quality Assessment for American Red Cross Blood Services. She graduated from Princeton University with a degree in biology and from Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, with a doctorate in behavioral and neural science.

A.J. Yates, MD

Associate Professor and Vice Chairman for Quality Management, Department of Orthopedic Surgery, University of Pittsburgh Medical Center Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania

Dr. Yates is a graduate of Harvard College, and completed his doctor of medicine, internship, and residency at Johns Hopkins. He is an Associate Professor and Vice-Chairman for Quality

Management for the University of Pittsburgh Department of Orthopaedic Surgery. He is the Chief of Orthopaedic Surgery at UPMC-Shadyside. Dr. Yates serves on the Surgical Committee for the National Quality Forum as well as CMS technical expert panels for Hospitalcompare.gov and Physiciancompare.gov. He chairs the AAHKS EBM committee and has helped AAOS prepare several national clinical guidelines. His research interests include interventions for osteoarthritis and performance measures.
